Dear Mayor and Council:

It is with mixed emotions that I announce my retirement from government on January 2, 2012. With few exceptions, I have spent the last 33 years of my life in public service. As with anything in life, there were good times and bad times, great times and catastrophic times. We inherited a city in dire financial straits, and through close partnership with the city council, put the city back on strong footing. I can't thank my staff enough, especially Ron Gorland and William Alonso, for their professionalism as they helped me develop the road map that started the city on a track to a brighter financial future.

I can look back with great pride on the things that were accomplished during my tenure as city manager. Certainly the new community center will stand the test of time and will serve the residents of Miami Springs for generations to come. The new restrooms at our parks, the addition to the country club, renovation of our aquatic center, bike path expansions and lighting, Curtiss Mansion restoration and many other projects that we have helped come to fruition will always be remembered and enjoyed by future generations.

My years on the city council also gave me a strong sense of purpose and accomplishment. There are always opposing forces working with and against you in this field, but I always did what I felt was the right thing to do for the City. I guess the residents knew that, as I ran unopposed in my final two terms.

My decision to retire is not based on any one factor. It is something we all do at some time in our lives. My good friend Rick Shaw asked Ralph Renick when he retired how did he know it was time to retire. Ralph's response was "When it's time, you will know".

My decision was set in stone by the recent death of my brother Carl. He was only 69. My father died at the age of 73. I will be 61 in June. I've survived cancer once. So I see life now on a much shorter timeline. At the risk of sounding trite, "my bucket list is full". I have postponed many things in my life because of my work, especially my last 16 years here at city hall. It is time I stepped back and focus on some other challenges and opportunities.

I still desire to continue the work we have started on 36th Street and downtown. That is why I don't plan to leave until the end of the year. I plan to be totally engaged in the business of the city until I leave and do as much as I can to help redevelopment get a healthy foothold. Also, we are entering the budget season and I want to be an active partner with you in that process. These will continue to be exciting times and my experience and knowledge of our City, our departments and the budget process itself would not be well served by an earlier departure.

While the recent editorial in The Gazette was flattering, and I have been asked by so many friends, acquaintances and staff to stay, that is just not in the cards.

You will still have a Cracker Jack staff in place when I leave and they will continue to serve the residents and the council well. They have been very loyal to me, but they are even more loyal to the City of Miami Springs and our residents. I also think you would be hard pressed to find a more capable replacement for me than Ron Gorland. His business acumen plus the government experience he has gained over the last seven years here in Miami Springs make him the perfect candidate.

In closing I wish to thank each of you for the opportunity to continue to serve my hometown. I won't be leaving or moving away, so if my opinion or expertise is ever needed, please know that you can call on me to help my hometown, Miami Springs.

Sec. 2-2060. - Creation of the Miami-Dade County Youth Commission.

There is hereby created the Miami-Dade County Youth Commission (the "Youth Commission"), which is an advisory board of Miami-Dade County. The purpose of the Youth Commission is to provide the youth of Miami-Dade County with a vehicle to learn about government, participate in the process of Miami-Dade County government, represent and articulate the needs of youth in the County, and advise the Mayor and Board of County Commissioners on matters affecting the youth and teen population, especially County programs relating to youth and teens.

(Ord. No. 10-05, § 1, 1-21-10)

Sec. 2-2061. - Duties and responsibilities of the Youth Commission.

The Youth Commission shall have the following duties and responsibilities:

- (a) Foster increased youth involvement in the affairs of County government;
- (b) Study problems and hold forums on issues, activities and concerns of youth in the County;
- (c) Comment upon existing or proposed legislation, ordinances, resolutions and policies that impact the youth in Miami-Dade County;
- (d) Present methods to resolve youth-related conflicts between youth and between youth and adults:
- (e) Recommend the implementation of community programs to improve the lives of youth;
- (f) Monitor programs and policies that affect youth to ensure that they are achieving the intended results;
- (g) Work with other youth organizations in the County to collaborate on shared issues and interests;
- (h) Submit to the Mayor and Board of County Commissioners an annual report of the activities of the Commission in the month of May prior to the end of the regular school year;
- (i) Serve as the Violence Intervention Program representative for their respective school, as permitted by the Miami-Dade County Public School System;
- (j) Facilitate an annual Youth Summit in conjunction with the Juvenile Services Department and the South Florida Youth Advisory Board; and
- (k) Utilize social networking sites and/or technology to engage and inform the youth of their community of important County activities.
- (I) Participate in a workshop which will introduce the Youth Commission members to a County Commission agenda process, a mock county commission meeting, the role of the officials who appoint them and the County Attorney, at a minimum.
- (m) The member of the Youth Commission appointed by the Mayor shall be designated as a member of the South Florida Workforce Youth Advisory Council.

Additionally, each member of the Youth Commission is to meet with the official who appointed the Youth Commission member on a quarterly basis or at the discretion of the appointing official, as is mutually convenient for the Youth Commission member and appointing official to discuss teen and community issues of concern to them.

(Ord. No. 10-05, § 2, 1-21-10)

Sec. 2-2062. - Commission Composition; Qualifications; Process for Nomination and Appointment; Exceptions to County Code; Term; Officers; Rules of Procedure; Staff

Support.

- The Youth Commission shall be composed of twenty-seven (27) youth who will serve as voting (a) members of the Youth Commission.
- Each County Commissioner shall appoint two members of the Youth Commission. At least one of the (b) students appointed by a County Commissioner shall be a Miami-Dade County public school student. One of the students appointed by a Commissioner may be a student attending a parochial or private school in the Commissioner's district. The members of the Youth Commission shall be between the ages of fifteen (15) to eighteen (18) years old at the time of appointment and be in the 10th, 11th, or 12th grade. To be qualified for appointment, such student shall have a minimum 2.0 grade point average and shall demonstrate a sincere interest and the motivation to work for the community and have a background in community-based activity.
- Each member of the County Commission shall receive the names of high school students from public, (c) private and parochial high schools in his or her district. Such high schools shall be requested to forward the names and resumes of interested students for appointment to the Youth Commission to the office of the County Commissioner of the commission district in which the high school is located. The County Commissioner shall interview the nominated student and forward the name and the resume of the students appointed by the County Commissioner to the Clerk of the Board of County Commissioners.
- The Mayor of Miami-Dade County, the Chairperson of the Board of County Commissioners, the County (d) Manager, the Clerk of the Board of County Commissioners and the Agenda Coordinator for the Board of County Commissioners shall each select a Miami-Dade Public School System student to be a nonvoting member of the Youth Commission. The Youth Commission member selected by each official shall meet the qualifications set forth in subparagraph (b) above. Each of these officials shall receive the names of high school students from the Miami-Dade County School Board. Each official or his or her designee shall interview the nominated student and forward the name and the resume of the student appointed by the official to the Clerk of the Board of County Commissioners. These nonvoting members of the Youth Commission shall be exposed to and given the opportunity to learn the role of the official who appointed them as nonvoting members of the Youth Commission.
- The Miami-Dade County Public School student who is appointed to serve on the Miami-Dade County (e) School Board shall be an ex officio voting member of the Youth Commission.
- Notwithstanding Section 2-11.38 of the Code of Miami-Dade County, the members of the Youth (f) Commission shall not be required to be an elector of Miami-Dade County.
- The term of office for each member shall be one (1) year. Members may be appointed for a subsequent (g) one-year term; provided, that no member shall serve more than two (2) years as a member of the Youth
- The Youth Commission members shall annually elect a voting member as chairperson and other (h) officers it deems necessary from its voting membership.
- The Youth Commission shall adopt its own rules and regulations, as may be necessary and appropriate (i) to carry out its responsibilities, subject to the approval of the County Mayor or his or her designee.
- The County Mayor shall designate staff support sufficient to carry out the purposes of this ordinance and provide facilities for meetings and other activities, as necessary. Programming for the Youth Commission shall be executed jointly and in coordination with the Teen Court and Violence Intervention Project programs,

(Ord. No. 10-05, § 3, 1-21-10)

Sec. 2-2063. - Youth Commission Committees.

The Youth Commission may establish such committees as are deemed necessary and appropriate to assist in its function and duties. Members of such committees may include nonvoting members and nonmembers of the Youth Commission.

(Ord. No. 10-05, § 4, 1-21-10)

Sec. 2-2064. - Meetings.

The Youth Commission, which is subject to the Government in the Sunshine and Public Records requirements, shall meet at the call of the Chairperson or at the request of the majority of the membership, but no less than once monthly. A majority of the voting members of the Commission shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. A vote of a majority of the voting members present constituting a quorum shall be required to constitute action taken by the Youth Commission. The meetings of the Youth Commission may be conducted in the Board of County Commission Chambers and if so conducted, shall be televised and broadcast on Miami-Dade TV.

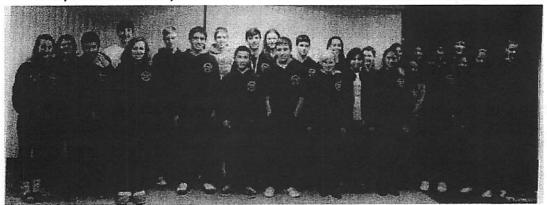
